 7 MR. LIOZ: Objection, legal conclusion.
 8 A. In my opinion, it's quite different. Because
 9 if they are registered voters, they live in the
 10 community.
 11 Q. Right, but if there's statistically more
 12 registered voters in Ward 6 than there is in Ward 1,
 13 by the same logic wouldn't Ward 6 have a negative
 14 power base compared to Ward 1?
 15 MR. LIOZ: Objection, legal conclusion.
 16 A. I don't see it as the same logic.
 17 Q. Why not?
 18 MR. LIOZ: Objection, legal conclusion.
 19 A. Because they live in the community. They
 20 care enough to register to vote, and they vote. They
 21 should have that power. If Ward 1 decides, people
 22 decide not to register to vote, then they lose, and
 23 they should.
