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<p style="text-align: right;">2</p> <p>1 PROCEEDINGS</p> <p>2 CHAIRMAN KING: The Senate Special Committee on</p> <p>3 Congressional Redistricting will come to order. The Clerk</p> <p>4 will please call the roll.</p> <p>5 THE CLERK: Senator King.</p> <p>6 CHAIRMAN KING: Here.</p> <p>7 THE CLERK: Senator Creighton.</p> <p>8 VICE CHAIR CREIGHTON: Here.</p> <p>9 THE CLERK: Senator Alvarado.</p> <p>10 SENATOR ALVARADO: Here.</p> <p>11 THE CLERK: Senator Hinojosa.</p> <p>12 SENATOR HINOJOSA: Here.</p> <p>13 THE CLERK: Senator Hughes.</p> <p>14 SENATOR HUGHES: Here.</p> <p>15 THE CLERK: Senator Miles.</p> <p>16 SENATOR MILES: Here.</p> <p>17 THE CLERK: Senator Parker.</p> <p>18 SENATOR PARKER: Here.</p> <p>19 THE CLERK: Senator Paxton.</p> <p>20 (No audible response.)</p> <p>21 THE CLERK: Senator Sparks.</p> <p>22 SENATOR SPARKS: Here.</p> <p>23 CHAIRMAN KING: Eight present, a quorum has been</p> <p>24 established.</p> <p>25 Members, the purpose of today's hearing is to lay</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">4</p> <p>1 Senate passed out in the first special session.</p> <p>2 This Committee held a hearing for public testimony</p> <p>3 on August 17th, and we heard from 42 witnesses. That means</p> <p>4 this Committee has heard testimony over this special and</p> <p>5 last special, if my math is correct, from 247 people</p> <p>6 testifying on redistricting.</p> <p>7 At the conclusion of the August 17th hearing, this</p> <p>8 Committee favorably reported SB 4 out of committee by a vote</p> <p>9 of six ayes to three nays.</p> <p>10 Now, where we're at this morning, on August the</p> <p>11 18th, as I said, the House Select Committee on Congressional</p> <p>12 Redistricting introduced a substitute bill for House Bill 4</p> <p>13 which they passed out of committee at that time.</p> <p>14 The substitute, which is now HB 4 engrossed and</p> <p>15 before us today, affected 12 congressional districts,</p> <p>16 including CDs 2, 6, 7, 8, 9, 14, 17, 18, 22, 29, 36, and 38,</p> <p>17 while maintaining the five now Republican-leaning districts,</p> <p>18 CDs nine, 28, 32, 34, and 35.</p> <p>19 Additionally, HB 4 slightly changed CD-16 and 23</p> <p>20 to move Fort Bliss into CD-16 and the El Paso general</p> <p>21 region.</p> <p>22 And, again, what I'm trying to do here is compare</p> <p>23 SB 4 to the engrossed HB 4 that's before us today.</p> <p>24 It keeps whole Navarro County which had previously</p> <p>25 been split, placing all of Navarro County into CD-6. It was</p>

Members, as stated on the posting, we will not</p> <p>2 be taking public testimony today.</p> <p>3 And let me pass the gavel at this time to Senator</p> <p>4 Creighton.</p> <p>5 VICE CHAIR CREIGHTON: Okay. Thank you, Chairman.</p> <p>6 At this time the Chair lays out House Bill 4 and</p> <p>7 recognizes Senate Sponsor Senator King to lay out the bill.</p> <p>8 Senator King.</p> <p>9 CHAIRMAN KING: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, and</p> <p>10 Members. I've just got a little bit I've got to go over</p> <p>11 here.</p> <p>12 I reintroduced SB 4 on August the 15th, the first</p> <p>13 day of the special session. Our committee heard SB 4 on</p> <p>14 Sunday, August 17th, and favorably passed it out.</p> <p>15 Now before us today is HB 4, the companion to SB 4</p> <p>16 that passed out of the House yesterday. There are some</p> <p>17 minor differences between SB 4 and HB 4 that I will review</p> <p>18 with you shortly.</p> <p>19 It is my understanding that the House Select</p> <p>20 Committee on Congressional Redistricting drew this revised</p> <p>21 version of the map with its outside counsel and experts.</p> <p>22 My counsel has reviewed this as well and concluded</p> <p>23 that it complies with all applicable law.</p> <p>24 Now, as I said, on August 15th I reintroduced</p> <p>25 Senate Bill 4, which was identical to the bill that the full</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">5</p> <p>1 partially on CD-17.</p> <p>2 It also moved Liberty County into CD-9 where it</p> <p>3 was previously in CD-36.</p> <p>4 The House Committee stated their overall intent of</p> <p>5 the changes was to increase political performance in</p> <p>6 existing Republican districts from the proposed plan.</p> <p>7 A review of the map -- again, we're talking about</p> <p>8 HB 4 engrossed. A review of the map shows that it</p> <p>9 accomplishes those goals through fairly minor changes.</p> <p>10 Nine of the 12 districts affected are Republican</p> <p>11 performing districts -- again, this is relative to SB 4 --</p> <p>12 six of which improved their Republican performance in the</p> <p>13 House substitute. Those are CDs two, eight, nine, 17, 22,</p> <p>14 and 38.</p> <p>15 The remaining three Republican districts, CD-6,</p> <p>16 14, and 36, slightly decrease Republican performance but</p> <p>17 remain 60 percent plus Trump 2024 districts.</p> <p>18 Two out of the three Democrat-performing</p> <p>19 districts, specifically CDs seven and 29, slightly decrease</p> <p>20 in political performance for Democrats but will still</p> <p>21 strongly perform for Democrats.</p> <p>22 The compactness also stays the same overall with</p> <p>23 some slight changes from the SB 4 map. As a reminder, both</p> <p>24 SB 4 and HB 4 have five districts that now lean Republican</p> <p>25 in political performance. Those five are CD-9, Houston; CD-</p>

<p>6</p> <p>1 28 in the RGV; CD-32 in the Dallas region; CD-34 in costal 2 south Texas.</p> <p>3 At this time this morning, I would ask for your 4 favorable consideration of House Bill 4 as engrossed. This 5 would be the map under Plan C-2333, Charlie 2333.</p> <p>6 I believe these changes -- I believe the changes 7 that it makes are minor relative to SB 4, and that they are 8 consistent with the goals that I've set forth for this 9 legislation.</p> <p>10 Those goals include: one, complying with 11 applicable law; two, strengthening Republican congressional 12 performance; and, three, maintaining compact districts.</p> <p>13 Now, HB 4 also corrects a concern that was 14 mentioned by witnesses from the El Paso area in one of our 15 previous hearings and brought up by Senator Blanco about 16 Fort Bliss.</p> <p>17 And, again, what HB 4 engrossed does -- is moves 18 Fort Bliss, or portions of it, the portions they were 19 concerned about, back into CD-16, as requested by the El 20 Paso constituents in testimony and by Senator Blanco.</p> <p>21 And with that, Chairman, I'd be happy to take 22 questions.</p> <p>23 VICE CHAIR CREIGHTON: Thank you, Senator King. 24 Members, questions? 25 SENATOR ALVARADO: Yeah.</p>	<p>8</p> <p>1 looking at it visibly it, it's obviously contiguous.</p> <p>2 It's still -- is amazingly more compact than many 3 of the congressional districts that are on this map across 4 the state of Texas.</p> <p>5 I can tell you that as you mentioned, that was not 6 in the original SB 4 configuration. But it still meets the 7 goals that I had for the legislation, and that's why I 8 brought HB 4 before us today.</p> <p>9 SENATOR ALVARADO: You said one of the other goals 10 was to create more opportunity for Republican wins, right? 11 CHAIRMAN KING: Yes. The intent was to improve 12 political performance specifically for the five 13 congressional districts I mentioned.</p> <p>14 SENATOR ALVARADO: And who -- where did you get 15 that idea from? 16 CHAIRMAN KING: Well, I think that's been 17 discussed a great deal between all the Republicans in the 18 Senate and in the House.</p> <p>19 And it's been discussed by the Government. And 20 it's been in the media. I think it's been a very prominent 21 issue even nationally.</p> <p>22 SENATOR ALVARADO: Well, it was discussed amongst 23 you all. But before that who put the bug in your ear about 24 that? 25 CHAIRMAN KING: I first learned about it probably</p>
<p>7</p> <p>1 VICE CHAIR CREIGHTON: Senator Alvarado. 2 SENATOR ALVARADO: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 3 Chairman King, you know, this map had some 4 significant changes. And there was not a public hearing in 5 the House Committee, there's not one here.</p> <p>6 And I'm just going to focus on now what is my 7 Congressional District 9. It has split up the east end 8 community and has paired us with Liberty.</p> <p>9 What we have in common with Liberty, I don't know. 10 And I don't know how that decision was based. But it seems 11 like -- well, no, you said it very plainly, the goal was to 12 create more opportunity for Republican wins in these 13 districts.</p> <p>14 And I just -- I wish that especially my folks in 15 the east end would have been able and come and give public 16 testimony.</p> <p>17 You talked about one of the goals being to keep 18 districts compact. But if you look at CD-9, by extending 19 all the way out to Liberty, it's not compact. Can you talk 20 about that a little bit, CD-9?</p> <p>21 CHAIRMAN KING: Well, as you mentioned, CD-9 moved 22 into Liberty County. It made it a better performing 23 Republican district, which was one of the objectives.</p> <p>24 From a compactness perspective -- and compactness 25 is a couple of different measurements for that. But even</p>	<p>9</p> <p>1 the same way you did, through the media.</p> <p>2 SENATOR ALVARADO: And who were you -- who was 3 quoted?</p> <p>4 CHAIRMAN KING: Well, I heard a number of people 5 quoted. I've heard congressional members quoted, I've heard 6 White House officials quoted, I've heard Governor Abbott 7 quoted.</p> <p>8 SENATOR ALVARADO: Speaking of congressional 9 members, did we have any testimony from Republican members 10 of Congress?</p> <p>11 CHAIRMAN KING: No. And I've specifically not -- 12 I have not spoken to -- and I've said this before. I have 13 not spoken to anyone in the White House, I haven't spoken to 14 anyone in the Justice Department. I haven't spoken to any 15 members of the congressional leadership.</p> <p>16 The only two congressional members I've spoken to 17 are ones I talk to all the time, and those just happen to be 18 my two congressional members and good friends. And we 19 didn't talk in detail about the map.</p> <p>20 SENATOR ALVARADO: Okay. Well, it seems like in 21 the regulation session nobody was even contemplating this.</p> <p>22 SENATOR MILES: Nor would they.</p> <p>23 SENATOR ALVARADO: Would you agree? In the 24 regular session.</p> <p>25 CHAIRMAN KING: I heard discussions of it before</p>

<p style="text-align: right;">10</p> <p>1 we adjourned, before we sine die from the regular session.</p> <p>2 SENATOR ALVARADO: When was that?</p> <p>3 CHAIRMAN KING: I would say -- I don't know. I</p> <p>4 think -- I really don't remember. I just remember during</p> <p>5 maybe middle of the regulation session I started hearing</p> <p>6 some discussion about it in the media and among just</p> <p>7 Republicans talking.</p> <p>8 SENATOR ALVARADO: That's interesting because this</p> <p>9 is the first time I'm hearing you even mention that, I mean,</p> <p>10 because we've talked about it in the hearings. And I don't</p> <p>11 recall any discussion until President Trump talked about it.</p> <p>12 And that -- I don't remember exactly the date of</p> <p>13 that, but I don't think it was during the regular session.</p> <p>14 I could be wrong. Maybe somebody can check.</p> <p>15 Anyway, that's all I have for now. I'll save the</p> <p>16 rest -- I'll have more to say tomorrow. Thank you.</p> <p>17 CHAIRMAN KING: Thank you.</p> <p>18 VICE CHAIR CREIGHTON: Members, additional</p> <p>19 comments or questions? Senator Miles, you're recognized.</p> <p>20 SENATOR MILES: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.</p> <p>21 Let me ask the obvious question, Mr. Chairman.</p> <p>22 Why are we not hearing testimony on the substitute map?</p> <p>23 CHAIRMAN KING: Well, as I mentioned, we've</p> <p>24 already had testimony from over 200 people on redistricting.</p> <p>25 And then we had 43 people testify just the other day on</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">12</p> <p>1 changes; is that correct?</p> <p>2 CHAIRMAN KING: It is different than the companion</p> <p>3 SB 4.</p> <p>4 SENATOR MILES: And would you agree with me that</p> <p>5 we're not allowing constituents to comment on the</p> <p>6 differences that you just agreed that we're making?</p> <p>7 CHAIRMAN KING: No. I think anybody -- the public</p> <p>8 portal is still open. Anyone can still file comments about</p> <p>9 it. And they can of course reach out to us.</p> <p>10 And we're just taking the same process that we use</p> <p>11 all the time on all different types of bills and subject</p> <p>12 matters with regard to when a companion bill catches up with</p> <p>13 the bill filed before the Senate.</p> <p>14 SENATOR MILES: Okay. Let me move on, Mr.</p> <p>15 Chairman.</p> <p>16 Chairman Hunter insinuated that the public was</p> <p>17 lucky that hearings on these matters were held at all. I'm</p> <p>18 going to quote him. He said: "We held three public</p> <p>19 hearings. We're not required to hold those hearings."</p> <p>20 With redistricting about -- affecting about 31</p> <p>21 million people in this state overwhelmingly without their</p> <p>22 consent, do you agree on that statement, Mr. Chairman?</p> <p>23 CHAIRMAN KING: I think we held six hearings in</p> <p>24 the Senate. And with regard to the 2020 redistricting data</p> <p>25 on which this is based, I think there's been a total of 21</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">11</p> <p>1 SB 4.</p> <p>2 The -- this is the companion to SB 4. And it's</p> <p>3 been very common practice in the Senate forever that if it's</p> <p>4 a companion bill and you've already had a hearing on it and</p> <p>5 already had a lot of testimony, that you do not have to take</p> <p>6 -- or do not need to take public testimony again when you're</p> <p>7 considering the companion in the committee.</p> <p>8 So we -- the parliamentarian has affirmed this.</p> <p>9 And, again, it's common practice we do a lot of times every</p> <p>10 session when companion bills catch up.</p> <p>11 SENATOR MILES: Would you agree, Mr. Chairman, two</p> <p>12 things; that, one, this is not an ordinary situation that</p> <p>13 we're -- that is redistricting?</p> <p>14 CHAIRMAN KING: I think we're -- the process we're</p> <p>15 taking for redistricting in this special session is the</p> <p>16 common practice that we have taken in every redistricting</p> <p>17 session that I've been a part of.</p> <p>18 SENATOR MILES: Okay. Would you agree that by us</p> <p>19 voting on a committee substitute on which no testimony can</p> <p>20 be given or was given in the House, we are actually shutting</p> <p>21 out even more constituents from this process?</p> <p>22 CHAIRMAN KING: No. Not at all. As I said, we've</p> <p>23 had over 200 people testify during the course of what, the</p> <p>24 last six weeks or so.</p> <p>25 SENATOR MILES: But this substitute is making some</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">13</p> <p>1 hearings in the Senate over the course of -- well, since</p> <p>2 2020.</p> <p>3 And so I think we've had a tremendous amount of</p> <p>4 input. I think we had over 3800 clicks to the online when</p> <p>5 we were doing our teleconference hearings.</p> <p>6 And then again just for SB 4 and this special, we</p> <p>7 had 70 something people I believe register to testify. And</p> <p>8 we had I think it was 43 give us testimony on the companion</p> <p>9 to HB 4.</p> <p>10 SENATOR MILES: So that you're -- are you saying</p> <p>11 that you agree with him or you don't agree with that</p> <p>12 statement?</p> <p>13 CHAIRMAN KING: No. I think we've had quite a bit</p> <p>14 of testimony and --</p> <p>15 SENATOR MILES: So you don't agree with that</p> <p>16 statement.</p> <p>17 CHAIRMAN KING: Well, I'm not saying whether I</p> <p>18 agree with it or disagree with it. I'd have to ask you to</p> <p>19 read it to me again but -- and I didn't hear him say that.</p> <p>20 SENATOR MILES: I'd be happy to, Mr. Chairman.</p> <p>21 CHAIRMAN KING: Please.</p> <p>22 SENATOR MILES: Chairman Hunter stated: "We held</p> <p>23 three public hearings. We are not required to hold those</p> <p>24 hearings."</p> <p>25 And my question to you was with redistricting</p>

14	<p>1 about to affect over 31 million people statewide</p> <p>2 overwhelmingly with their consent, do you agree with that</p> <p>3 statement?</p> <p>4 CHAIRMAN KING: I can only speak for the Senate.</p> <p>5 I believe we've had a sufficient number of hearings before</p> <p>6 the Senate.</p> <p>7 SENATOR MILES: Sufficient answer.</p> <p>8 Mr. Chairman, Chairman Hunter also stated on</p> <p>9 yesterday that he consulted with counsel to make sure that</p> <p>10 this new map was VRA compliant.</p> <p>11 You also stated that you wouldn't vote on a map</p> <p>12 unless it was -- the lawyer told you it was VRA compliant;</p> <p>13 do you still stand by that statement, Mr. Chairman?</p> <p>14 CHAIRMAN KING: I do.</p> <p>15 SENATOR MILES: Thank you.</p> <p>16 And two more questions, Mr. Chairman. According</p> <p>17 to the Texas legislative counsel, as of this moment, 38.6</p> <p>18 percent of those voting age population in District 9 is</p> <p>19 Black.</p> <p>20 In newly created District 9, only 10.2 percent of</p> <p>21 the voting age population is Black. This is a negative</p> <p>22 change, Mr. Chairman, of 28.4 percent. Does that 28.4</p> <p>23 percent drop in Black voting population seem race blind to</p> <p>24 you?</p> <p>25 CHAIRMAN KING: So I haven't looked at any racial</p>	16	<p>1 based.</p> <p>2 CHAIRMAN KING: Again, I haven't looked at any</p> <p>3 racial data. And I have tried very hard to not do anything</p> <p>4 that was race-based.</p> <p>5 SENATOR MILES: Okay. Let's go on to District 18.</p> <p>6 According to alleged counsel again, Mr. Chairman, District</p> <p>7 18, which hasn't had real representation for almost a year</p> <p>8 now, would go from 34 percent of voting age population being</p> <p>9 African American to 45 percent.</p> <p>10 All of this happening while Hispanic votes age</p> <p>11 population drops 7.7 percent from 3.9 to 32 percent, and the</p> <p>12 Anglo population dropping 4.7 from 19.4 percent to 14.7</p> <p>13 percent.</p> <p>14 Would you agree that it's very much looks like</p> <p>15 based on the data that we are just packing African American</p> <p>16 votings into District 18, moving everyone else out?</p> <p>17 CHAIRMAN KING: I can't respond with regard to</p> <p>18 racial data.</p> <p>19 What I can tell you is that I'm told that -- or</p> <p>20 I'm aware that CD-18 will -- should still perform very</p> <p>21 strong as a Democrat district.</p> <p>22 SENATOR MILES: It should, that's a correct</p> <p>23 statement, Mr. Chairman.</p> <p>24 Senator King, my objection to this racist-rigged</p> <p>25 districting is not changed with this new map. In fact, my</p>
15	<p>1 data. The -- you mentioned citizen voting age population,</p> <p>2 or CVAP. I haven't looked at CVAP. I will tell you that</p> <p>3 CVAP is not really census data. CVAP is an annual estimate.</p> <p>4 It is very problematic in its accuracy.</p> <p>5 But this map is based on 2020 data. And, again, I</p> <p>6 haven't looked at racial data myself.</p> <p>7 I did ask our counsel to give HB 4 engrossed a</p> <p>8 very good scrubbing. They have reported back to me that it</p> <p>9 complies with all applicable law, which of course would</p> <p>10 include the VRA.</p> <p>11 SENATOR MILES: So this is a House map. And</p> <p>12 you're saying that you didn't look at it, Mr. Chairman,</p> <p>13 before you brought it to us.</p> <p>14 CHAIRMAN KING: I learned about it probably when</p> <p>15 you did on Monday, when it was presented. I learned about</p> <p>16 the changes then.</p> <p>17 And before I took a hard look at it, I asked our</p> <p>18 counsel to scrub it and to tell me whether or not it was</p> <p>19 legally sufficient. When they did, then I tried to do a</p> <p>20 deep dive into it. And that deep dive is what I tried to</p> <p>21 relate in my opening remarks.</p> <p>22 SENATOR MILES: Okay. So just so we're clear on</p> <p>23 something, Mr. Chairman, a 28.4 percent drop in Black</p> <p>24 population in the redo of District 9 and done -- just</p> <p>25 coincidental and that you're saying that this is not race-</p>	17	<p>1 opposition gets even stronger because now we're -- it's</p> <p>2 obvious that we're packing Senate District 18.</p> <p>3 And it's obvious that these maps are actually race</p> <p>4 -- they're not race blind as you stated they are. But now</p> <p>5 there is literally zero opportunity for public to have any</p> <p>6 input in this map.</p> <p>7 You break up communities but take no</p> <p>8 responsibility for them, as my counterpart said. And I'll</p> <p>9 be giving a no vote on this and any other committee</p> <p>10 substitute that comes before this committee, Mr. Chairman.</p> <p>11 Thank you for now.</p> <p>12 CHAIRMAN KING: Thank you.</p> <p>13 VICE CHAIR CREIGHTON: Thank you, Senator Miles.</p> <p>14 Senator Alvarado, you're recognized.</p> <p>15 SENATOR ALVARADO: Thank you.</p> <p>16 I -- you know, I'm just -- I can't let this go,</p> <p>17 Mr. Chairman.</p> <p>18 You mentioned that you heard about this middle of</p> <p>19 the session. But if I recall, I think Lieutenant Governor</p> <p>20 Patrick on sine die talked about, you know, not seeing us</p> <p>21 until the next regular session.</p> <p>22 Governor Abbott has talked about let's get this</p> <p>23 all done, we don't want to go into a special.</p> <p>24 And the first reports of anything having to do</p> <p>25 with this redistricting efforts came on right around June</p>

<p style="text-align: right;">18</p> <p>1 the 9th or 11th.</p> <p>2 But you're saying that you heard some talk about</p> <p>3 this in the middle of the regular session. So that's just</p> <p>4 not jiving for me.</p> <p>5 CHAIRMAN KING: I didn't take notes on the dates.</p> <p>6 And maybe I'm a little bit off. But I seem to remember</p> <p>7 discussions maybe even a little bit in the media, but I seem</p> <p>8 to remember discussions before the session was over.</p> <p>9 Maybe I'm wrong. Maybe I'm thinking about the</p> <p>10 period between sine die and, you know, the first few weeks</p> <p>11 of June or something.</p> <p>12 But for some reason I seem to recall having heard</p> <p>13 discussions, not that I generated, but I seem to have heard</p> <p>14 discussions during the regular session.</p> <p>15 Maybe some of the other senators would remember</p> <p>16 that as well or remember differently. I don't know. I</p> <p>17 wasn't taking notes. I wasn't thinking about redistricting</p> <p>18 at the time. But I think that's when I first started</p> <p>19 hearing about it.</p> <p>20 SENATOR ALVARADO: Well, I mean, I can't obviously</p> <p>21 speak for you. But I would strongly disagree because when</p> <p>22 you laid out the resolution for the rules, you mentioned</p> <p>23 that the only reason we were doing this, because it was</p> <p>24 asked, and you said because the Governor put it on the call</p> <p>25 for the special.</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">20</p> <p>1 done in a regular redistricting process, not in mid-decade.</p> <p>2 CHAIRMAN KING: No, I -- well, I mean, it's a long</p> <p>3 time ago, I don't remember.</p> <p>4 But I remember there were some court cases and</p> <p>5 things moved from -- so during that ten-year period, I</p> <p>6 changed senators. During that ten-year period, I changed</p> <p>7 congressional members without ever moving. I mean, that's</p> <p>8 just kind of the nature of redistricting.</p> <p>9 And we've talked before about how many times I</p> <p>10 think we've had changes during the interim in maps. I</p> <p>11 believe -- have to go back and look at my notes, but I</p> <p>12 believe every redistricting cycles beginning 1960.</p> <p>13 And so -- and I -- my home county is split as</p> <p>14 well. And that's just part of the -- part of trying to meet</p> <p>15 the one person, one vote population requirement as well.</p> <p>16 SENATOR ALVARADO: Yeah. And I wrote down those</p> <p>17 years that you mentioned. There were quite a few. But that</p> <p>18 has been driven by mainly court cases, not because whoever</p> <p>19 was in the White House said they needed more congressional</p> <p>20 districts of their party. That's a big difference.</p> <p>21 CHAIRMAN KING: Well, I know in 2003 it was -- it</p> <p>22 was because the Republicans took a majority in the House for</p> <p>23 the first time since -- well, in the legislature for the</p> <p>24 first time since 1870. And we did redistricting at that</p> <p>25 time in 2003.</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">19</p> <p>1 And then there was some talk, some reference to</p> <p>2 the DOJ letter. All of that happened in the special. There</p> <p>3 was no mention of any of this in the regular session.</p> <p>4 If so, I can't imagine why the governor and</p> <p>5 lieutenant governor would be talking about not coming back</p> <p>6 for a special, let's get this all done, and then here we</p> <p>7 are.</p> <p>8 So I just want to be clear because when we're</p> <p>9 talking about making changes to people's congressional</p> <p>10 representatives, this is a serious topic.</p> <p>11 I'm really bothered by this new map because it's</p> <p>12 taking my home, my east end community, splitting it, and</p> <p>13 putting us with Liberty County, and not having any</p> <p>14 opportunity for the public to come and address this.</p> <p>15 And these changes were made just in the last</p> <p>16 couple of days.</p> <p>17 CHAIRMAN KING: I understand your point. Where I</p> <p>18 -- my home is, I think it was during the 1980 redistricting</p> <p>19 cycle in which there were a number of court cases and other</p> <p>20 changes, I think I went through three state senators without</p> <p>21 ever moving in a ten-year period. So I understand.</p> <p>22 But that just occurs in redistricting. But --</p> <p>23 SENATOR ALVARADO: When was that you mentioned?</p> <p>24 CHAIRMAN KING: I think that was during the 1980s.</p> <p>25 SENATOR ALVARADO: Okay. But that was probably</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">21</p> <p>1 SENATOR ALVARADO: Wasn't that because the courts</p> <p>2 did it and then so you wanted to come back and have the</p> <p>3 legislature do it?</p> <p>4 CHAIRMAN KING: No. In '03, we did the</p> <p>5 legislature because you had a Republican Senate and a</p> <p>6 Democrat House, and a Republican governor. They were unable</p> <p>7 to pass a House, Senate, or congressional map.</p> <p>8 In 2001, the redistricting board drew the House</p> <p>9 and Senate map. In the 2002 elections, again, for the first</p> <p>10 time I think since the 1870s, the Democrats lost control of</p> <p>11 redistricting.</p> <p>12 And in 2003, in the special -- in a special</p> <p>13 session Governor Perry put congressional redistricting on</p> <p>14 the call, and we took it up.</p> <p>15 And I think we went through three special</p> <p>16 sessions, because the Democrats left the state again then as</p> <p>17 well, and produced a congressional map.</p> <p>18 SENATOR ALVARADO: Okay. Well, it -- on what I'm</p> <p>19 being told and what I'm just reading back, it seemed like it</p> <p>20 was following the court case and legislature coming back --</p> <p>21 CHAIRMAN KING: There wasn't any --</p> <p>22 SENATOR ALVARADO: -- with the new --</p> <p>23 CHAIRMAN KING: -- court case. We just had not</p> <p>24 done any congressional redistricting in 2001. And tried to</p> <p>25 do state Senate and House and were unable to pass a bill.</p>



<p style="text-align: right;">22</p> <p>1 And so the redistricting board again took up House and  2 Senate, and then we did congressional in 2003 --  3 SENATOR MILES: Okay.  4 CHAIRMAN KING: -- because we hadn't done it in  5 2001.  6 SENATOR ALVARADO: And was there -- was that --  7 did that come from the White House, whoever was in power, or  8 was that something --  9 CHAIRMAN KING: I don't --  10 SENATOR ALVARADO: -- the state leadership and the  11 legislature decided?  12 CHAIRMAN KING: I don't recall. I just recall it  13 being put on the call.  14 SENATOR ALVARADO: Okay. So right now as it  15 stands, in Congress there are 25 Republicans and 13  16 Democrats, right?  17 CHAIRMAN KING: Yes. That's --  18 SENATOR ALVARADO: Okay.  19 CHAIRMAN KING: -- part of the Texas delegation.  20 SENATOR ALVARADO: Okay. and you said that one of  21 the objectives was to create more Republican congressional  22 districts. Why did you feel that was important?  23 CHAIRMAN KING: I always feel that's important.  24 SENATOR ALVARADO: Okay. Because now it's going  25 to -- from 30 to eight. I'm just -- you know, --</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">24</p> <p>1 VICE CHAIR CREIGHTON: -- you're recognized.  2 SENATOR HINOJOSA: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.  3 And I just have simple points and questions --  4 points of clarification.  5 I know Senator Miles asked -- it wasn't clear, but  6 the changes that were made in Senate Bill 4 by House Bill 4  7 in those congressional districts, those voters didn't have a  8 chance to express their opinion after the changes were made.  9 There was no public hearings on that point.  10 CHAIRMAN KING: So as far as the Senate, this is  11 the hearing that -- the hearing that we're having today is  12 the only hearing on HB 4 engrossed before the Senate.  13 However, it's the companion to SB 4, and we've had  14 a previous public hearing with public testimony on SB 4.  15 SENATOR HINOJOSA: But we haven't had any on this  16 side, on the Senate side. I know it gets overexplained.  17 But the point is that I'm trying to make is there  18 was no public feedback or no public testimony on the changes  19 that were made to those congressional districts that came  20 across from the House on House Bill 4 as compared to Senate  21 Bill 4.  22 CHAIRMAN KING: My only answer, sir, is that we're  23 following standard Senate process in dealing with a  24 companion bill when it catches up to the Senate bill.  25 SENATOR HINOJOSA: And I understand that. I  4 am very proud of the work that the U.S. House has done and  5 the President and the U.S. Senate over these past eight  6 months now.  7 I was very concerned and disturbed with what was  8 done during the Biden administration.  9 And I'm very concerned that if the Republicans  10 lost the majority in the U.S. House, that the next two --  11 that the two years following the midterms could be very  12 harmful to Texas and to the United States.  13 And so I want us to maintain a Republican majority  14 and hopefully increase a Republican majority in the U.S.  15 Congress. I mean, no, we  2 didn't have any hearings pretty much on this changes made in  3 the -- on our Senate bill from House Bill 4.  4 CHAIRMAN KING: I understand.  5 SENATOR HINOJOSA: The other one is there seems to  6 be a contradiction between the three goals that you stated  7 as it relates to improving Republican performance and then  8 keeping communities of interest compact.  9 And the reason I say that because I look on  10 Hidalgo County, which that's where I live in McAllen. You  11 look at Congressional District 15 and Congressional District  12 28, you cut Hidalgo County in half.  13 Not only that, you separate Edinburg, the  14 university, from the City of McAllen. Even DHR, doctors  15 hospital, which has part of the hospital is in McAllen, the  16 other half is in Edinburg, is split.  17 And you look at that's -- and if you look, you  18 even split the city of Pharr in the House Bill 4. Pharr-San  19 Juan-Alamo, which is one school district, is split in half.  20 So how does that compare trying to keep community of  21 interest compact?  22 CHAIRMAN KING: Well, first off, you know, if you  23 look at the existing congressional map or the House and  24 Senate map, in trying to do one person, one vote, it's  25 inevitable that a lot of cities and counties are divided,</p>



<p style="text-align: right;">26</p> <p>1 and school districts.</p> <p>2 For one reason, cities and counties and school</p> <p>3 districts don't all share the same boundaries naturally.</p> <p>4 But, you know, compactness has -- communities of</p> <p>5 interest has to do with a lot more than just geography.</p> <p>6 Communities of interest, as you mentioned, can be a city.</p> <p>7 They can be an historic neighborhood.</p> <p>8 They can be a school district. But they can also</p> <p>9 be a water district, they can also be a water basin, they</p> <p>10 can be a transportation district, they can be an economic</p> <p>11 district of some sort. They can be any number of things</p> <p>12 that draw people together in common.</p> <p>13 And I use my -- I guess I use my home district.</p> <p>14 My district stretches all the way from far east Tarrant</p> <p>15 County out into west Texas. And some of those counties have</p> <p>16 4,000, one of them does, 4,000; another one has just 10,000.</p> <p>17 And then I have Tarrant County that's a large</p> <p>18 metropolitan area. I</p> <p>23 believe they're in the same DPS region. And you split the Hillcrest Black historical</p> <p>2 community.</p> <p>3 You split the Port of Corpus Christi which is an</p> <p>4 economic driver you mentioned a while ago from the</p> <p>5 university.</p> <p>6 So it splits all this communities. They have no</p> <p>7 relationship to the way the congressional districts are</p> <p>8 drawn. They go way up north or way into rural counties that</p> <p>9 do not have committee of interest, same economic drivers, or</p> <p>10 the same historical roots.</p> <p>11 So, I mean, those are issues that I think are very</p> <p>12 important to my congressional districts that now we have to</p> <p>13 sort of get to know a different congressional congressman</p> <p>14 and -- congress person.</p> <p>15 I mean, I know the district as well as the one</p> <p>16 that was previously there. <p style="text-align: right;">27</p> <p>1 district, all coming out of the metroplex area.</p> <p>2 So there's a lot of things that create communities</p> <p>3 of interest besides just the geography of a county or a city</p> <p>4 or a school district.</p> <p>5 SENATOR HINOJOSA: Well, the -- all the factors</p> <p>6 you mentioned are being violated in the way Hidalgo County</p> <p>7 was being split.</p> <p>8 And the communities that I know and I live in all</p> <p>9 my life, McAllen, you split it from Edinburg, you split the</p> <p>10 (indiscernible) school district, it's one school district</p> <p>11 and it's split in half.</p> <p>12 So those are very important to our community and</p> <p>13 keeping those community of interest because congressional</p> <p>14 goes all the way up to almost San Antonio.</p> <p>15 The other one-half supposed to be Corpus Christi,</p> <p>16 Nueces County.
